HONOLULU – On the afternoon of City Council's consideration of Bill 40, some of the island's mobile food vendors will seek to remind councilmembers that food packaging is valuable fuel for sustainable power on the island. The Council will be voting on whether to proceed with a ban on all non-compostable foodservice containers.

Aloha Pops will help kick off Oahu's new "Toss Your Trash, Fuel Our Aina" campaign by giving away locally-made fresh frozen treats on the grass outside Honolulu Hale from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. The campaign is designed to reduce litter by celebrating Oahu's existing Waste-to-Energy system from H-Power.

Also present will be Simply Ono, a local lunchwagon typically parked between the State Capitol and Honolulu Hale. Simply Ono will be displaying a sign that says "Don't Take Our Plate Lunch," a reaction from the Hawaii Restaurant Association to the proposed bill.
